

Pupil & Forces premium strategy for Breage Church of England Primary School

The government introduced the Pupil Premium Grant in April 2011. This grant, which is additional to main school funding, is seen by the government as the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between certain groups of children. The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. Schools can decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility. Children from forces families also receive a forces premium, which is allocated for children from these family backgrounds.

At Breage Church of England Primary School we aim to support all our pupils. We do this by providing high quality classroom teaching supplemented by interventions to support vulnerable learners as and when required. The governors believe in using this grant to enable all children to enjoy access, participation and achievement within school life, particularly for those identified as disadvantaged, vulnerable or under-achieving, through high quality teaching & learning and resources. The main barriers to educational achievement for children who are eligible for pupil premium funding include social, emotional and mental health issues and low attendance.

£23,340 Pupil premium funding has been used for the academic year 2019-20 to try to overcome these barriers.
